Dear Friends and Supporters,

As we reflect on the past year, we are filled with deep gratitude and pride for the continued support, generosity, and partnership that fuel our mission at Goodwill of the Finger Lakes.

Together, we are changing lives every day across the Rochester, Finger Lakes, and Syracuse regions. Whether it's through a donated item, a purchase at one of our stores, or a monetary gift you give to support our programs, your involvement has helped us create lasting impact across our community.

Over the past year, we celebrated several incredible milestones including our most successful Gala to date, raising more than \$308,000 in support of our mission. We opened two new, expanded retail locations at The Mall at Greece Ridge in Rochester and entered Tompkins County with Goodwill Ithaca. And thanks to your donations, we kept 28.8 million pounds of useful items in circulation—advancing our commitment to sustainability and innovation in circularity and recycling.

We proudly served 171,014 people across Rochester and the Finger Lakes region through a wide range of mission-driven programs. Our Goodwill Learning Academy supported 62 adult learners working toward their high school diploma, while Goodwill Vision Services provided assistance to more than 1,515 individuals navigating life with low vision. Our workforce development efforts empowered over 334 people with training and employment support. Additionally, 211/LIFE LINE connected 150,204 individuals to vital community resources, ensuring help was available when it was needed most. Through the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline, we provided more than 19,000 counseling sessions to people in crisis, offering life-saving support and compassionate care. We also remain steadfast in our commitment to living our mission by creating quality careers and hiring individuals with barriers. We're now up to almost 800 employees and have just been named "Great Place to Work" for the second year in a row. These are just a few examples of the life-changing impact made possible through Goodwill's programs—and the generous support of our community.

But behind every number is a person. A job seeker who found meaningful employment. A teen in crisis who received life-saving support through 988. A person with vision loss gaining independence. An adult who gained their high school diploma. A family connecting with other parents of kids who are blind building their own support networks at one of our monthly recreational events. These are the stories that remind us why our work matters.

We are honored to serve this community, and we know that none of this is possible without you—our donors, financial supporters, shoppers, partners, volunteers, and team members. Your belief in our mission propels us forward as we continue to grow, innovate, and serve.

Thank you for being a vital part of our Goodwill team. Together, we are building a more compassionate and empowered future.

Meet Izzy

Goodwill Learning Academy's First High School Graduate

From as young as I can remember, I did everything on my own. At 14 years old, in 9th grade, I ended up leaving school to take care of my mom who was sick; by 17 she had passed and I had no one to turn to and no clear path forward. I never asked for help – it just wasn't an option. But when I started at Goodwill Learning Academy (GLA) last year, I had to unlearn that mentality and accept that leaning on others was okay. Opening myself up and trusting that people genuinely wanted to see me succeed was one of the hardest lessons I've ever

faced. I had to break down the walls I'd built over years of surviving alone – walls that kept people out, even when I desperately needed them in.

Slowly, with the compassionate, judgment-free support of the GLA team, I realized I didn't have to do it all by myself anymore. Their support was life-changing. I'm living proof that this program works. And you know the need is real. So many young adults are struggling right now to find their way, each facing unique challenges from different walks of life.

By offering free transportation, laptops, flexible scheduling, a coach, and in-person or online access to education modules, GLA removed every barrier for me to succeed.

And I want our community to know that I am just one of many – Goodwill is changing so many people's lives.


I'm proud to be the first to graduate from this program. When I told Mari Lynn, my daughter, I was getting my diploma, she gave me a big hug. Not only did I want to prove to myself that I could do it, but my daughter was also a big reason. I hope my journey inspires her to overcome any challenges she faces, to always believe in herself, and to understand other people's perspectives and unique journeys.



It's so important that we come together as a community to lift each other up, because when we do, we all rise – and our entire community becomes stronger.

Since achieving my diploma, I've been looking at college programs because I know I am ready to take that next step. Not to mention, I just published my second coloring book.

Today, I'm living with purpose. For my daughter, for myself, and for the future I never thought possible because of Goodwill. And for that, I can't thank them enough.



Meet Helen

A Goodwill AbilityOne Employee

Growing up in a small village in Kenya, my favorite childhood memory was racing all the kids in my village – and winning. Running was something I've always loved. I was also a strong student until I turned about 12 years old. Then, something changed. My grades began to drop, and no one could figure out why. When a new principal arrived at my school, he suggested my father to take me for an eye examination.


That's when we discovered the reason behind my struggles – and when my journey with low vision and eventual blindness began. Everything changed after that.

I had to leave my home and move hundreds of miles away to attend a school for the blind. It was there that I learned how to navigate the world without sight. I gained new skills, a renewed sense of confidence, and something even more incredible – I discovered the Paralympic Games.

That discovery opened doors I never imagined. I began traveling internationally as a competitive runner, representing not just myself, but my country. My journey eventually brought me to the United States, where I not only competed, but also met my husband.

While five months pregnant with my son, my life took yet another turn. My husband left me. As a single parent who is blind, there were times when I felt completely hopeless. How would I pay my rent? What opportunities were even available to me? I was under enormous stress, trying to make ends meet while also being the kind of role model my son could be proud of.

That's when I reached out to Goodwill's Vision Services team – and my life changed.



They introduced me to Goodwill's Industrial Sewing Program. And from that moment on, things began to shift. I found not just a skill, but a purpose. I became a sewing professional, able to provide for my son and no longer live in fear of what tomorrow might bring. It truly transformed my life.

When I was young, my father always said that sewing was a celebration – bringing pieces together to form a whole. That is what Goodwill has done for me. It made me whole again.

And every day, as I sit at my sewing machine and stitch new beginnings, I imagine him celebrating right alongside me.
